HAVERFORD, PA (May 22, 2013)— Main Line Art Center and the Women's Board of Bryn Mawr Hospital, are proud to present the work of Professional Artist Members Linda Dubin Garfield, Mary

Kane, and Rona Cordish Satten at Bryn Mawr Hospital in the Bodine Lobby. The exhibition runs May 24 through September 22, 2013, and is part of the Art Center's *Exhibitions in the Community* Program, which places the work of its accomplished artists in libraries, hospitals, and other community settings. Launched this spring, the new program grew out of the Art Center's mission of making art more accessible by creating meaningful partnerships across the community.

This exhibition continues a partnership with Bryn Mawr Hospital that began in February, when Main Line Art Center facilitated a family workshop called Make, Give and Take, where children and caregivers learned the fundamentals of printmaking and then created cards that were distributed to pediatric patients at the hospital.

"We are thrilled to be partnering with Bryn Mawr Hospital to bring the healing powers of art to their patients and our community," says Amie Potsic, Executive Director at Main Line Art Center. "Presenting the work of our Professional Artist Members in a setting like Bryn Mawr hospital highlights how meaningful, empowering, and nurturing art can be."

With a color palate that evokes a sense of calm and warmth, the paintings and prints featured in the exhibition highlight the healing power of art for both the artist creating the work and those viewing it. Many of the works reference nature and the healing powers of the earth's energy, which are sources of inspiration for the artists featured. In particular, artist Rona Cordish Satten's current artwork is a manifestation of her deep connection to the energy in nature, developed through practicing and teaching taiji and gigong for the last dozen years.

Rona Cordish Satten holds a Masters of Creative Arts in Therapy degree from Hahnemann Medical College. Satten studied at the Barnes Foundation and continues her lifelong art making at the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts. Her current artwork is a manifestation of her deep connection to the energy in nature, developed through practicing and teaching taiji and qigong for the last dozen years. These are healing practices that work with qi, the life force energy. Nature helps balance and harmonize our feelings and bodies, and the etchings Satten makes from real leaves embody this healing energy. Her etchings are widely exhibited and are found in public collections including Le Salle Bank and AtlantiCare Medical Center, and in numerous private collections. Linda Dubin Garfield, award-winning printmaker and mixed media artist, creates visual memoirs exploring the mystery of memory and the magic of place, using hand-pulled printmaking techniques, photography, collage, and digital imaging. She also creates installations that include public participatory art, especially when she is exploring themes relating to women in today's culture. In 2005, Garfield founded ARTsisters, a group of professional artists who reach out to each other and their community through art. In 2007, she started smART business consulting, helping emerging artists reach their goals and their audience. Today Garfield serves on several non-profit boards, including Main Line Art Center, and appreciates her good fortune to be able to make art every chance she gets.
