ASK THE ARTIST

CREATIVE ANSWERS TO HELP YOU GROW

Dear Artist,

I am a longtime maker of art but I'm brand new to Main Line Art Center. Everyone in my class is very nice and very talented, but a lot of them have been in this class together for many years. I feel intimidated. Also, there are some skills that they have already practiced together for some time, and I don't want to hold anyone back with my questions, but I don't want to not ask them either. What do I do?

Dear Inspired But Intimidated,

Your nervousness is totally understandable, but don't let it hold you back. Entering a new group is always a bit intimidating, but remember that students come to Main Line Art Center not just to improve their artmaking, but also to meet other people who want to create.

If you're having difficulty getting your questions answered or finding the confidence to ask them, consider coming to the next class early and asking the teacher about how to best bring this up.

It is wonderful that you care enough about your classmates to be nervous about interrupting their learning with your questions, and that is always good to keep in mind, but don't forget that this is your community now, too.

Just like in your art, move forward with sincerity and creativity and a willingness to make mistakes (and learn from them). That's what learning and artmaking are all about.

WORD ON THE STREET:


Executive Director Amie Potsic shares stories about the Art Center from students and Teaching Artists
