

### **COMMUNITY**

# BACK FROM MOROCCO: A CULTURAL MOSAIC

### CAROL STIRTON-BROAD

Recently, beloved MLAC mosaics teaching artist Carol Stirton-Broad traveled to Morocco to experience another culture and another approach to community art. She has been kind enough to share some of the thoughts and photosthat emerged from her trip. We hope you find them as motivating and meaningful as we did.

Travel has a way of changing you in ways you don't always predict. Recently I traveled to Morocco with my mother-in-law, Rita. It was an amazing trip and Rita is a wonderful traveling companion but I was overwhelmed by the sensations that were packed into the twelve-day extravaganza. The tour we took was upscale and well organized. It removed the stresses of unfamiliar languages


and carrying luggage but it also forced us to move through time and space in a very prescribed way. We were exposed to a tremendous amount of stimulation but didn't always spend a lot of time absorbing the colors, smells, flavors, and patterns of all the amazing places we visited. I barely remember certain parts of the trip. What I had was a first world problem (wonderful trip - too much stimulation) and an older artist's brain. I was in danger of losing all the wonderful experiences and information that I had temporarily deserted my normal life to acquire. I needed to find a way to filter and retain as much as possible.

I reached for my camera, in this case my iPhone, and became maniacally obsessed with documenting the amazing mosaics that surrounded us. I was hoping that the photographs would act as visual prompts, allowing me to reconstruct the amazing trip after I returned home. From the Roman mosaics at Volubilis to the walls of the hotels we stayed in - I snapped away. I also ate anything put in front of me and touched or smelled anything that seemed appropriate.



As I struggled to process all I was experiencing I became aware that I was moving through a society that still had very active communities of makers. Though there are modern malls and shops people still weave, work metals, chip tile, dye leather, and carve wood, not only for tourists but more importantly because of their society values and rewards them for being good craftspeople. These people are not romanticized and expensive human contradictions to a mechanized world but are instead the norm for their society. In my rush to preserve the images from the trip, the amazing repeating patterns, the fabulous color combinations, and the beautiful textures, I was missing something important. It wasn't just the objects themselves that I needed to record but I wanted to be more in touch with a society which still has many people very much involved in daily acts of creation.

At leisure with my photographs now I am seeing many things I missed during the original picture taking. I also realize that I am trying to hold onto the experience just a little bit longer. I know that I am lucky here in America to have found a way to both create art and to share my love for the well-crafted object with my students. I also know that many people here see art and craft as expensive luxuries - not activities that are essential to daily life. I am saddened by that. Freedom from hunger, safe housing, health care, and a good basic education are among the essentials our citizens need for the society to thrive and prosper but the intangibles provided by the arts and crafts are priceless. For some of us lifesaving, I think that one of the benefits of travel is the fresh eyes that you see your own home with upon returning. I can thank my recent visit to Morocco for the renewed vigor with which I am defending the arts in America today.



### **ART** TERMS

#### **AUTOMATISM**

The process of writing or creating art without conscious thought. The term was borrowed from physiology, which uses the term to denote involuntary processes that are not under conscious control, such as breathing. The Surrealists later applied to techniques of spontaneous writing, drawing, and painting.



#### **SUMMER ART CAMP & PRE-TEEN STUDIOS**



Bernice Paul has been a student for many years at Main Line Art Center and is also one of our active Professional Artist Members.

Bernice's work has been accepted into exhibits at the Philadelphia Museum of Art, Woodmere Art Museum, Berman Art Museum in Collegeville, the William Penn Museum in Harrisburg and Philadelphia's City Hall. Her work is also in both public and private collections, and recently, four of her landscape panels were installed at Lankenau Hospital.
