

Now, their sons are grown with families of their own. Eric is a family practice physician in Marietta, PA and his wife Terra is a







HAPPY MOTHER'S DAY

To All Mothers And Grandmothers

When I think of Mother's Day I think of my own mother, gone for over twenty years now, remembered each day and missed beyond measure. I also think of my mother's mother with whom we lived in a multigenerational household. This is a little window into her life.

Grandmom was a sweet and funny soul. Her name was Mary Josephine Finnerty McCart, but everyone in our town called her "Mom" because she was everybody's mom. Here's why.

Grandmom had eleven children and 47 grand- and great-grand-children. I like to believe I was her favorite although the other 46 might disagree. Grandmom was a happy person and even though she suffered child loss and a good amount of hardship over her lifetime, Grandmom soldiered on and never allowed her sorrows to steal away her sweet, light-hearted and loving disposition.

Grandmom also possessed an unwavering Irish Catholic faith. In fact, the first lesson she taught me was the importance of having a religious belief and how -- never mind that she was an old-time Catholic -- she loved singing Protestant hymns as "The Old Rugged Cross."

But where Grandmom drew an uncrossable line about her personal religion was with the Sacrament of Penance. That's where in her faith the penitent said aloud to a priest in confession what wicked thoughts arose in his or her mind plus what acts were actually (more-or-less) committed. Some people believed going to confession once a year at Easter sufficient; Grandmom McCart wasn't one of them. Her idea of being a good Catholic meant going every Saturday afternoon. So that's what she did.

After dinner was prepared and in a pot, she removed her full apron, took a quick bath and headed off on foot for church. Like

many women in her day, she didn't drive. She also regularly took me with her and I suspect the simple reason was to set me on some right path which steered clear of that devil's workshop Grandmom occasionally mentioned.

After thinking of her transgressions on her wore-out and tired holy knees, in the small town church she had known her entire married life, Grandmom prepared to confess and hopefully be absolved.

Then the time arrived for the actual confession. Reverently she entered the small, dark, closet-like confessional where she knelt once again and whispered to the priest on the other side of the screen exactly what malevolent deeds she committed and how many times she committed them. When she was finished confessing the priest blessed her and Grandmom opened the door always wearing a relieved smile -- a signal to me that all was forgiven and she was home free.

But on this particular summer afternoon, Grandmom left the confessional with her head low and her kind hazel eyes cast downward.

Alarmed, I wildly imagined she had confessed to some horrific misdeed like saying a bad word. "What's wrong, Grandmom?" I asked gently as only a 9-year-old can. Blinking back tears, she dabbed her eyes with a hankie.

"Father McHugh offended me a bit." Sniff-sniff with another quick dab of her eyes.

"Oh, Grandmom," I said in a hushed tone, "What did old Father McHugh say to you?"

After another tiny sniff-sniff, she answered, "Mary Jane, Father McHugh whispered ever so low I strained my ears to hear him, 'Mrs. McCart, he says, for the love of God, ya don't have to be coming every bloody week to confession. Ya have no sins; not a one; you're good with the Lord of heaven and earth and everything in between."

Grandmom started misting up again telling me

that she had sins and lots of them. I was only a kid but believe me, I had way more sins than she but I handled my conscience differently -- I walked out of confession grinning like I got away with something! Maybe that's why she took me so often -- she knew she had to reform me.

Grandmom taught me yet another indelible lesson -- "drinking" could turn a person's life upside down never to be right-side up again. It's an understatement to say she had a strong dislike of anything to do with alcohol. Sometimes she would shake her head from side to side and say "So-and-So should live with a little more temperance in his life." Then she'd raise her eyes heavenward. She never said who So-and-So was because what was said to her stayed with her. Grandmom once told me "Mary Jane, since the 12th Century, monks practiced the art of distilling spirits but I say, "No! No! Only believe in The Holy Spirit!" So, in our home, if anyone wanted a drink they better have their beer or highball on the sly and sometimes my father did just that at a corner tayern in our neighborhood called Frankie Conway's.

This favorite hangout of locals was owned by a professional boxer-gone-blind by a punch. He bought the place in the late 1930s. Out of respect for dear Grandmom, no one dared call this watering hole "Conways." Instead, everyone called it "That Place" so Grandmom wouldn't find out. Looking back I think Frankie Conway might have been So-and-So.

I remember one of the times my dad told both Grandmom and my mother that he was taking my brother and me out for an ice cream. My brother would elbow me and grin as we walked the four blocks. Suddenly, we found ourselves at "That Place" sitting on a spinning bar stool and sipping root beer floats from frosty mugs where lots of red-faced men told funny jokes that always began with "Did ya hear the one about...?" Now that I'm thinking about it, Grandmom probably did know where we were heading but she loved my father enough to look the other way and probably told it in confession to Father McHugh who, for all I knew, went to Conway's, too!

So mothers and grandmothers, keep up the


good work. Continue







hanging careers can be challenging. Particularly when the roles are as disparate as attorneys and artists. Fortunately, Barry Simon worked his "practice of art" around his legal prac-

tice over the course of many years. He painted after hours and on weekends at the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts, and when he became a Board Member of the Delaware Valley Art League, he learned a good deal from the DVAL's 250+ wonderful members. When he was ready to make the leap from the law, he pursued even further coursework at the Main Line Art Center. He related:

Legal training really helped in my decision. I knew that preparation is the hardest part of any case. But with preparation, everything gets easier. So I took a series of courses – from Raiku pottery to painting - at the Main Line

Art Center. All the classes enhanced my knowledge and honed my main focus - which is painting.

Considering Barry's four decades practicing law, one would think he might prefer to do realistic portraits or literal urban landscapes. But those styles and topics don't pique his interest:

I used to do still lifes, but never even attempted to paint "true-tostill-life" images. Unconsciously, I would use color, shapes, and forms in more creative ways. E.g.: I'd place blue apples against a light green background. Some people might think it's not as technically demanding as realism, but I don't necessarily agree.

I do like keeping one foot in reality, and one in abstraction. Painting a boulder can be so engaging and good for the spirit. It starts as a spherical-like, geometric shape, but the colors develop as you

> interact with the object. It's a lyrical process. And when you stare at your subject for hours, studying it, you get outside of yourself. You're in a different zone. When you finally look away, everything has changed. It's as though you have been meditating all that time, and have just emerged with a joyful result you can share with others.

BANDIT ON CAR

ROBS CONDUCTOR AT PISTOL POINT

While Passengers Sit In Trolley, Near Newtown Square, Carman Is Held Up

Thief's Reserve Gun Comes In Handily Victim, Not Knowing Robber's Purpose At First, Accidentally Knocks Weapon From His Grasp

LLANERCH, Pa, Jan. 1 [1905]. A holdup with a dash of wild Western color to it occurred last night on the Philadelphia and West Chester trolley line, halfway between Newtown Square and West Chester, when a man, armed with two big revolvers took Conductor Robert E. Patterson off his car, relieved him of all the silvers and coppers he had, then forced him to get back and ring the bell to go ahead. All this happened while four passengers remained seated in the car, all but one ignorant of what was going on.

Chester county officers believe they will be able to run down the highwayman, who is described as tall and slender, with light hair and a small light moustache. He wore a dark slouch hat and a long tan mackintosh. He is not believed to be a professional, although there is evidence to show that the man had planned the robbery carefully.

Two leather revolver holders, covered with mud, were found in the little wait-room at Street road, where the hold-up took place, and also a dinner pail of coal oil and pieces of rag. The highwayman, the police think, had his revolvers hidden somewhere in the woods which line this part of West Chester Turnpike on either side. When he went for them last night he took the coal oil along to clean the weapons. The dinner pail was a brand new one, and the police are trying to find the store where it was bought.

The Conductor's Story

The story of the hold-up, as told by Conductor Peterson [sic], and corroborated by Horace Bishop, who lives near West Chester, is as follows:

About half-past ten o'clock last night the car on which Conductor Patterson and Motorman Alfred Walton of Llanerch were the crew was several blocks off from Street road [today better known as Rt. 926 ed./ coming toward Newtown Square, when the crew of a car going toward West Chester, Able Herring and Walter Rebe, informed Patterson that there was a suspicious looking man at the switch on the other side of Street road.

Motorman Walton was notified to watch for the person referred to, but when he received a signal from a man standing on the platform at the Street road waiting room he stopped the car, thinking it was an ordinary passenger.

Was "Well Heeled"

The moment the car stopped, this man, who was evidently the one the other crew saw at the switch further down, jumped on the rear platform, revolver in hand. Conductor Patterson did not see the weapon, and in throwing up his arm to ring the bell and give the signal to start he struck the man's hand and knocked the pistol to the floor. Patterson was about to apologize for the accident when be realized the situation.

Quick as a flash the highwayman whipped out another and still larger pistol and pointing it at the conductor's breast said: "Don't ring that bell, but get off the car."

"When I hesitated for a moment," said Patterson, in telling the story, "the man brought his gun closer to my breast and I naturally decided the best thing to do was to obey him."

"Hurry up now, shell out," said the stranger, who had picked up his other weapon and shoved it into his pocket. The conductor drew out the change he had in both side pockets of his coat, \$8.15 in all, and handed it over. Then he threw open his coat and satisfied the robber that he had no wallet. He did have a number of one and five-dollar bills in his trousers pocket, but he was not going to give up that until he had to.

"Now Get Back and Go"

"Now get back on your car and pull the bell" said the highwayman, and he drew the second revolver as he spoke and held it ready for the motorman or any of the passengers who might prove troublesome. He was not hindered, however, and when the car pulled away he vanished in the dark.

In the smoking compartment, which was next to the rear platform, Horace Bishop, who is employed in the car barn at Llanerch, was seated when the stranger jumped on the car. He was dazed for a moment when he saw the revolver flash, and then he got up and walked through the car to the front platform.

"I didn't have any gun," said Bishop, in telling about the affair, "so I thought I'd see if the motorman had one."

Motorman Walton says that by the time Bishop reached the front platform and started to tell him about the hold-up, he got his signal to go ahead and the robbery was over.

Seated in the front part of the car at the time of, the robbery was a man and two women, but none of the three knew anything about the hold-up until after it was over and the car was in motion again.

At the substation at Ridley Creek, Conductor Patterson telephoned to the Llanerch trolley station and two of the men from the car barn, Robert Knox and George Henson, armed with revolvers, took the next car to the scene of the holdup. They hunted about for some time, but could find no trace of the highwayman, except the revolver covers and the oil can and rags he had left behind.

[Editor's note: The next day, January 2, 1905, the Inquirer reported that Ralph Crole was arrested when found in Joshua Garrett's woods near Malvern. He admitted to the crime, and said that he had recently been released from prison for a year, convicted of shooting at a farmer. "He declared he could get no work and turned to robbery that he might buy food. It is said that the man's mind is affected." A search of census records shows no Ralph Crole in the area, but a Ralph Crowl from Chester County was married with a child in the 1920 and 1930 census. Hopefully that was our Ralph, who straightened up and flew right, after his brush with the law.]

Historic Newtown Square Day! If you want to see a trolley car just like the one involved in this robbery, located not too far from where the robbery occurred, come out to Historic Newtown Square Day on Saturday, June 3rd, where most of the festivities will be occurring at the Drexel Lodge Park on West Chester Pike. The Newtown Square Railroad Museum has acquired an old trolley car that ran on this line, on display at its Museum at Drexel Lodge Park. The Museum is open that day, and will be surrounded by activities, music, food and history from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00. Come out and learn more about your community and help us make history.
